

Then there is **Hope for Justice**, which garners intelligence on the perpetrators of these crimes and helps to liberate victims. They have offices in Manchester and their website address is www.hopeforjustice.org.uk.

Anti-Slavery International is a nondenominational organisation doing similar work. We can help by praying for the organisations undertaking this vital work and by supporting them in practical ways. We can raise awareness and build networks – you could even write to your local MP. The Prime Minister wants Britain to lead the world in abolishing modern slavery, as it did centuries ago. The Pope and the Archbishop of Canterbury have made a joint statement that it is the task of all Christains to unite to rid the world of slavery. Maybe we can all make a difference.

churches can often feel that there are no 'great causes' anymore and that it is hard for individuals and small groups to make a difference in the world. However, in the last year or two, I have come to feel that there is one evil that people are really beginning to tackle, and that evil is slavery – people-trafficking and forced or bonded labour.

Parliament is drafting an antislavery law, and the police and legal professions are working to combat the practice both now and in the future. Spokesmen for the police say that victims need the help of churches and charities; their situation often puts them in illegal employment, and they may be without legal right to remain in the country, making them understandably wary of all 'officials'.

But we can help – as citizens and as Christians. Throughout the churches, people are working in this area in a variety of ways to combat the trade and help the victims. For Christians, who believe that all human beings are created in God's image, the anti-slavery cause is one which unites us: for everyone, it is a matter of basic human rights.

The Salvation Army works with the police when they find victims who need practical help and every kind of loving care, so one simple way of helping would be to donate.

28 October: Clarkson Anniversary

On the 28 October we will remember Thomas Clarkson's ground-breaking 1787 anti-slavery speech at Manchester Cathedral, on the 227th anniversary of the occasion. A Clarkson play will feature as part of our historical drama series in late October.

Cathedral Bees

WOE, WOE AND THRICE WOE! I'm beginning to think that you have a jinxed Canon Apiarist!

This is my third year as a beekeeper, and you'd think I'd be able to get it right for the bees by now. My first year – with one hive – was magical, easy, exciting. Year two, when the hives for which I was responsible rose to eight was a challenge – but still successful and great fun. This year, it seems that every hive I touch gives me a new problem.

We started this season with three colonies (a fourth, which had been ill, unfortunately perished over winter). In the spring, all three colonies got rid of their queens: we found one, with a distinctive marking on her back, dead outside the hive. Nevertheless, we persevered as they gave us new queens of variable quality.

As I write, at the end of July, the situation is as follows:

Hive A, which has a queen I couldn't find for months, is going great guns! We will have a good harvest from this hive, probably better than last year.

Hive B was also forging ahead admirably, but when I took samples of bees from each of the four hives to check for disease I found that this one was suffering from high levels of an illness called 'nosema'. There is no veterinary treatment, but best practice is to get them to make new comb and remove the old. This means they have to concentrate on making wax, rather than collecting honey. Now that they've done that, the collecting season is nearly over.

Hive C decided they wanted to swarm. 'This is the time,' thought I, 'to do an "artificial swarm" and replace the colony that perished'. So I did. The outcome, however, was a disappointment. The hive didn't produce the promised queen and, being made up of older bees and with no new bees, it is now on the decline.

Then, about a month ago, Hive C's queen suddenly stopped laying properly; presumably she'd not mated well in the early spring. So the colony is getting by, but not producing honey. I'm thinking of re-queening the colony, to build up for next year.

A bee colony is a wonder of God's creation. As St Chrysostom says, 'the bee is more honoured than other animals, not because she labours but because she labours for others'. The queen provides headship, sets the 'tone' of the hive by her pheromones, and provides the offspring for the community. A good queen leads a good colony. But she doesn't reign supreme, by any means!

It is the ordinary 'house bees' – the young ones – that support her in all other aspects of enhancing the community.

And if the queen does not provide the 'leadership' that the community needs, then that support is withdrawn...
And the colony can be quite ruthless.

Let's pray for good queens in our hives, and pray also for all humans in leadership roles. They have heavy burdens placed upon them, and it is hard (even impossible) for them to get it right. At least we can have the awareness to help, nurture, support and offer guidance to those in authority. By the time you read this, we should be getting ready for our honey harvest. Fingers crossed!

We love to see people enjoying the summer sun on the Cathedral lawns and Victoria Street. Next time you sit in the gardens, take some time to think about those who've worked in the sun, wind and rain to keep it the beautiful haven that it is.

Devotional

A Saint for the Month

19 September
Theodore of Tarsus, Archbishop of Canterbury, 690 AD

Theodore was a Greek monk with a reputation as a scholar and teacher, and aged over 60 when the Pope, Vitalian was looking for a candidate for the vacant See of Canterbury in the Saxon kingdom of Kent. One candidate, Wighard had died and another, Adrian had declined the offer; but Theodore accepted, was ordained and consecrated, and in 669 AD became the 8th and one of our greatest archbishops.

Theodore was an organiser: he visited most of his province, built schools and founded dioceses; he sorted out the difficulties between St Chad and St Wilfred and called the first Synod of the Anglo-Saxon Church at Hartford in 672. His greatest achievement was to transform the barely organised missionary church of St Augustine into the well-organised and administered body we know today.

Bede, the great historian of the early English church, tells us little of Theodore as a Christian man, beyond that he was one of the heroes of the early English Church.

As the first archbishop willingly obeyed by his clergy, he clearly had gifts of leadership as well as an ability to get on with difficult people – saints included – and end quarrels amicably.

At his second synod at Hatfield, during the Monothelite Controversy, Theodore kept the church on the side of orthodoxy. Monotheletism was the understanding that as Christ had two natures, human and divine, he therefore had two wills. The orthodox correction to this was that his human will was always obedient to the Divine, as in the Lord's Prayer, 'Thy Will be done.'

Theodore died about age 87, testifying to rare vigour in an age when few lived beyond 70. Today, our Church is also going through a difficult time of doctrinal and organisational change with our 105th Archbishop of Canterbury, Justin Welby in a situation not dissimilar to Theodore's in the 7th century. May God grant him the same grace to see us safely through.
