

Sub-Dean's Corner

In Hallowed Footsteps

Our current Sub-Dean looks back to a benevolent predecessor...



In August we were delighted, once again, to be involved in the Manchester Dig the City festival. We were surrounded by great exhibits in all shapes and sizes. Amongst other things at the Cathedral there was a 'sock tree', which stood elegantly by the tomb of Canon Cecil Wray. It reminded me that I walk past that tomb daily to go into the Dean's Door without really thinking about the remarkable and wildly eccentric priest who is buried there.

Cecil Daniel Wray was a very popular priest at the Cathedral, serving for an astonishing 56 years. He started off as a Chaplain, a contemporary of the famous Joshua Brookes and one who could rival the latter's claim to be the most prolific conductor of marriages and baptisms in history. Later he was elected to a Fellowship; and when the Collegiate Church became a Cathedral in 1847 Wray was one of the Canons, eventually becoming Sub-Dean. I clearly follow in hallowed footsteps!



Wray was certainly an eccentric, turning up at the Cathedral in a 'carriage and four' with liveried footmen. Getting down from his carriage he would bow to the Dean, shake his fellow Canons by the hand, then proceed to shake the hands of the Minor Canons with two fingers – or a single finger for curates.

On the occasion of his 88th birthday, he set up a fund for the provision of socks for the poor on his birthday each year, 21 January. There were to be two pairs of 'good Worsted stockings' given to eight men and eight women in need. The charity fund was, at Wray's request, called 'Canon Wray's Birthday Gift'. Our quirky sock tree brought back the story of this eccentric benefactor, now long gone.

If you look at his tomb you will see verses from Psalm 26:

O LORD, I love the habitation of thy house, and the place where thine honor dwelleth.


As we reflect on his life, we also reflect on our own ministry in what is now a very different city, nearly 130 years later. Those words around his tomb tell us that this house of God in which we serve and minister is truly amazing, not just because of its history or its beauty, but first and foremost because it is the place where 'God's glory' dwells. Cecil Wray was committed to that throughout his ministry. To make it a living reality in 2014 we must retain this vision of our Cathedral as a place of prayer and worship, before anything else. Our prayers throughout each day and our daily celebration of the Holy Eucharist are the framework around which the rest of our life as a vibrant Cathedral in a vibrant city is built.

For Cecil Wray, being a place of prayer meant engaging with the people who came through the door, and trying to meet their needs. Caring for the needs of anyone who steps through those same doors in 2014 is still a huge part of what we do, and underpins the amazing work of the Cathedral Volunteer Programme and the newly re-housed Booth Centre Charity, amongst many other things. This November, the Cathedral will again host the Booth Centre Sleepout, which sees hundreds giving up their beds for a night in the cold to raise funds for the charity. Somehow I think Cecil Wray would approve!

Perhaps the time has come for a new annual 'sock day', around 21 January... Watch this space!

Manchester workforce grew from 17,000 to 180,000, and the Revd Brookes conducted more baptisms, marriages and funerals than any other clergyman in England. One audience member, Alan Maude, brought along a marriage certificate of a relative married by Brookes in 1791!

Corn Exchange Developments

If you have been to the Cathedral or around Exchange Square recently you will have seen that work on the Corn Exchange redevelopment has begun. The Cathedral has been working closely with Interserve and Queensberry, who are managing the project, to ensure that the redevelopments complement Cathedral activity and fabric development plans. The Corn Exchange is set to re-open in Easter 2015.

Organ Project Update

We can now confirm the key dates for the organ project works, which will begin with the refurbishment of the Jesus Chapel pipes in January and February 2015 and end with the voicing of the new instrument, hopefully in September/ November 2016. Most of the building work will take place off-site, so any major disruptions inside the Cathedral building will be roughly limited to July-September 2015 during the dismantling of the old organ and May-September 2016 for the installation of the new. There will be a temporary instrument for music in the intervening period. We have a number of education and community projects planned to run alongside the dismantling and installation, both of which are momentous occasions in the Cathedral's history. We look forward to confirming these in due course. Keep up-to-date by our website and social media.

Finally, it is with great sadness that we report the death of Ken Tickell, of

Tickell Organ Builders. We would like to take this opportunity to express our deepest sympathies to Ken's family, on behalf of the Cathedral community. The programme of works for Manchester Cathedral's new organ has remained unchanged despite this sad event, and it is thanks to both Ken's hard work and the dedication of his family and closest colleagues, Tom Jansky and Simon Brown, who will continue to lead the project to its completion – the last and biggest that Ken worked on.

Devotional

A Saint for the Month

9 October Robert Grosseteste, c. 1175-1253 Bishop of Lincoln, philosopher, scientist

Robert Grosseteste was lucky to be born when and where he was. In those days, sons of peasants could only 'make good' through the Church; and this was a time when the Church was central to European society, when its founding of the first universities was re-invigorating its intellectual and spiritual life.

It's likely that, as a Suffolk boy, Grosseteste studied at Paris and Oxford, before going on to lecture at Oxford in law, theology, medicine, mathematics and the natural sciences. He was later appointed to be the equivalent of our modern University Chancellor.

In 1235 he became Bishop of Lincoln, the largest diocese in England where he proved to be an energetic reformer, removing clergy who were slack in their pastoral duties – as one might expect of someone who was present at the signing of the Magna Carta in 1215. On a pilgrimage to Rome, he even took on Pope Innocent IV and the Vatican for corruptions at the very heart of Papal power. His carefully prepared legal case was ignored, however, and he was reckoned fortunate to have escaped excommunication.



Much of what the Reformer John Wycliffe (c. 1320-1384) later campaigned for had been anticipated by Grosseteste: especially his criticism of the Papacy, his sympathy for the Greek Orthodox Church and the importance of preaching and pastoral work.

In today's scientific world, Grosseteste is remembered together with his student, Roger Bacon (1214-1294) as one of the pioneers of the experimental method, especially in his study of light.

In his studies on light and creation he came up with the idea that the universe started as a point beginning in time that was similar in many ways to the contemporary Big Bang theory.

As a mathematician he seems also to have anticipated Georg Cantor (1845-1918) by being the first to propose the paradox that not all infinities are equal.

Following his death, attempts were made to have him canonised, but now, after long neglect, the polymathic stature of Robert Grosseteste is again being appreciated.
